NCE UPON A TIME - and it seems like a long time ago, though it was only 1993 - a group of local people put together a report to the City Council making out the case for the Bishopsworth and Malago Conservation Area.

As we reported in the March 1997 *Newsletter*, the Council's Planning Committee finally agreed in February this year that work would be undertaken in financial year 1997/98 to investigate the proposed conservation area. I am delighted to say that work has now started, as promised. In August I had the pleasure of taking two planning officers on an abbreviated version of the Bishopsworth Village Trail by way of introduction to the (sometimes hidden) architectural and historical features of our area. Laurie Bingle knows our patch well, and we have been in touch with him on Chestnut Court, for example. Robin Smyth is new to this side of town, but was quickly appreciative of many of the things which our 1993 Report had identified. Both of them enjoyed the walk - though 'forced march' may have been a more accurate description, and on a very hot day, too!

We have agreed to provide Robin and Laurie with a summary of ways in which M.V.C.G. helps to maintain and improve the area - garbage raids, the hanging basket competition (see page 2), the finger post (see page 3), our

ideas for Elm Tree corner, for the 'Matties' block of shops, for the Vale Lane entrance feature to Manor Woods etc. etc. The existence of a group of volunteers ready and able to contribute both ideas and practical help will itself add to the case for the proposals when the report goes to the Planning Committee.

A NEW SHOP FOR BISHOPSWORTH

T IS A PLEASURE to report that the old shop premises at the junction of Church Road and Grange Road are being revitalised. **Amcraft Designs** have opened for business at 2 Grange Road, Bishopsworth. The shop specialises in handmade reproduction Victorian furniture, soft furnishings and re-upholstery.

The business started at a workshop at the Gatehouse Centre and, once it became established, it was decided to seek larger premises in a more prominent position. The relocation of the shop in Bishopsworth was not only to maintain the local contacts and business already built up but also because south Bristol has only three businesses providing this type of service.

POINTING THE FINGER

ND SPEAKING OF THE FINGERPOST, for some time now one of the arms has been missing, broken off in an accident. To get to the broken bit, three other parts have to be removed, and several decades of rust have had their effect. We have dispensed copious quantities of penetrating oil and we shall return for another try. Watch this space!

GETTING IN THE SWIM

ROM 1ST SEPTEMBER 1997, Bishopsworth Swimming Pool, along with all Bristol's sports centres and swimming pools, has been managed and run by Bristol Community Sport Ltd. Bristol Community Sport is an Industrial and Provident Society, a workers' co-operative managed by the people who work in the sports centres and swimming pools for the benefit of the community.

The lack of capital funding, combined with budget restrictions, has made the financing of necessary repairs and refurbishments difficult or impossible. Bristol Community Sport has been established to protect and develop the leisure facilities within the city. Any profits made by the company will be reinvested in the services.

The new Board of Directors consists of a Managing Director (Lindsay Renwick), six employees, a member from the Bristol Chamber of Commerce and Initiative, a member from the Bristol Sports Council and a member of the general public.

Bishopsworth Pool was built in 1974 on the site of the Congregational Chapel, which was built in 1828. The triangular site has been the centre of the village for many hundreds of years, and it was here that the Chapel of Ease was built in the twelfth century on land granted by Robert Arthur, Lord of the Manor.

The Pool serves a catchment area of Bishopsworth, Withywood, Hartcliffe, Highridge, Whitchurch and Bedminster Down. It has a capacity of about 430,000 litres (95,000 gallons) and it measures 25 metres long by 10.5 metres wide. Its deepest point is 2.3m (7'6").

There are sessions for everyone:

- Women in the Swim (exclusively for women)
- Adults only swim
- Lunchtime Lane Swim
- Adult Lane Swim
- Splash Tots (for mothers and young children)
- Fifty Plus Swim
- Early Morning Swim
- Aquarobics



A disabled hoist is available for those people with special needs. There are reduced rates for Leisure Card holders.

Swimming lessons are available for children of all ages, and there is a series of 10-week courses leading to the A.S.A. award scheme.

The local team is headed by Andy Farmer, the Manager, assisted by five lifeguards: Colin Chudley, Chris Ross, Alan Riddock, Samantha Evans and Amanda Wyatt. The staff work a shift system between the hours of 7.30am and 10.00pm and are responsible for the vast number of duties necessary to keep the Pool operational and safe.

Swimming is a great way to keep in shape and keep fit. It's also a social occasion - for example, you could ring the Pool to book a swimming party for the children. And if you don't already swim, it's never too late to learn. To enable this new initiative to succeed and progress it is necessary for us, as a community, to support it in every way possible. Bookings and information are available on site from the local management team or by telephone on 964 0258.


